IMPACT AID SURVEY CARDS

Every year local school districts must apply for Federal Impact Aid funds from the U.S. Department of Education. These funds compensate school districts for the loss of local tax dollars from tax exempt federal property in the area.

Schools must conduct a federal residence and employment survey on a yearly basis to obtain a current count of families in the district who live on/or work on federal property. This survey is critical to each district's resources for students. The results of the Impact Aid survey help support each district's request for these federal funds. (*continued on pg.4*)





Navy School Liaisons Provide SEVEN CORE SERVICES to Assist Families:

School Transition Services (PCS Cycle)

School Liaisons assist families with school transfers and help "level the playing field" for military children and youth.

Command, School and Community Communications

School Liaisons serve as subject-matter experts for installation commanders on K-12 issues, helping to connect command, school and community resources.

Partnerships in Education (PIE)

PIE creates a volunteer network of resources to support installation and community members who have a vested interest in the success of all youth.

Deployment Support

School Liaisons connects educators and families with the military deployment support system to inform them about the cycles of deployment and tools to assist educators and parents/guardians in working with military children.

Home School Linkage and Support

School Liaisons assist military families by gathering and sharing information on home schooling issues, policies and legislation from local school districts, and help leverage Navy CYP resources to support these families.


Post-Secondary Preparations

School Liaisons leverage installation and school resources to provide graduating military-connected students with access to post-secondary information and opportunities.



Special Needs System Navigation

School Liaisons provide information about installation and community programs and services, make referrals to the Exceptional Family Member Program (EFMP), and offer assistance in navigating the administrative systems within local education agencies.





LEGISLATIVE UPDATES

The following summaries provide a quick snapshot of legislation, that have recently passed, that impact military-connected students in that State. For more details, reach out to your installation's School Liaison (directory located on back cover).

FLORIDA

HB 633 K-12 Education

The bill requires that student whose parent active-duty military personnel and who meets the eligibility criteria for special academic offered through programs public schools must enrolled in such a program if student's the parent transferred to the state during the school year. The bill also provides that a student whose parent is on active military duty and is transferred within the state after the controlled open enrollment window can enroll in any school within the state.

HB 1597 FL Virtual Schools

The bill provides additional support to military children who are out-of-state due to the duty station of their military parent or guardian. The bill establishes a process by which a parent or guardian request flexibility assessment administration to student permit а participate in statewide. standardized assessments while out-of-state

HB 733 MS & HS Start Times

The bill requires district school boards to adopt middle and high school start times beginning with the 2026-2027 school year. By July 1, 2026, middle schools may not begin the instructional day prior to 8:00 a.m., and high schools may not begin prior to 8:30 a.m.

TEXAS

HB 2982 School Transfer

Relating to the transfer of certain public-school students who are children of certain military servicemembers.

HB 1955 Residency

Companion bill is SB-1008. Extends proof of residency for school enrollment purposes from 10 days to 90 days.

NOTE: School Liaisons are not lawyers. However, they can further explain each law to families and connect with the appropriate agency for further support.



LEGISLATIVE UPDATES cont'd

GEORGIA

SB 147 School Transfer

Permits students to transfer between local school systems without contracts between the local school system where the student resides and the local school system where the student seeks to enroll.

HB 310 Zell Miller Scholarship

Revises the definition of the term "Zell Miller Scholarship Scholar" by removing the SAT and ACT score requirements for students who graduate from eligible high schools.


HB 1111

Mandates pre-kindergarten and kindergarten for all children prior to entering first grade; includes mandatory pre-kindergarten programs in the student-based allocation of state funds.

The school district only reports the number of students living with families who live on and/or work on federal property. Schools do not report information about individual students in the Federal Impact Aid application. Contact your child's school office if you need a new form or have questions about how to complete the survey.

Juniors, reviewing the list and knowing what scholarships they can apply for helps them be prepared for next year's applications.



FAFSA Opens October 1st

Affordable college and career training opportunities are available for everyone. The first, best step is to apply

for financial aid via the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Students should apply for financial assistance as soon as possible after October 1.



Apprenticeships Provide a Unique Post-Secondary Option for Students

Apprenticeships offer a distinctive postsecondary option for students in the United States. Unlike traditional academic apprenticeships provide pathways, combination of on-the-job training and classroom instruction, allowing students to gain practical skills and knowledge in a specific trade or profession. This hands-on approach enables individuals to develop valuable expertise while earning a wage, apprenticeships making an attractive alternative to traditional higher education. Additionally, apprenticeships often lead to industry-recognized certifications credentials, enhancing employability and doors rewarding opening to career opportunities.

Joining a Military Academy

Joining a military academy is a significant and rigorous process that requires careful preparation and dedication. Military academies are institutions that train future officers for the armed forces, and they typically offer a four-year undergraduate education along with military training and leadership development. Here are the general steps to consider if you are interested in joining a military academy:

Research and Choose an Academy: Research the different military academies and determine which one aligns with your goals and interests. Visit their official websites and view pre-recorded video admissions briefs and/or visit in-person admissions infomation sessions. In the United States you can consider the United States Military Academy at West Point, the United States Naval Academy, the United States Air Force Academy, the United States Coast Guard Academy and the U.S. Merchant Academy (USMMA).

Meet Eligibility Requirements: Ensure you meet the eligibility requirements for admission to the academy of your choice. These requirements may include age limits, citizenship status, physical fitness standards, and educational prerequisites.

Apply for Nomination: Most military academies in the United States require candidates to obtain a nomination from a member of Congress, the Vice President, or a service branch (e.g., Army, Navy, Air Force). Start the nomination application process early, as it can be competitive.

Complete the Application: Once you have secured a nomination, complete the academy's application, which typically includes essays, standardized test scores (SAT or ACT), academic transcripts, letters of recommendation, and a comprehensive medical examination.

Interview: Be prepared for an interview as part of the application process. This interview may be conducted by academy staff or a selection committee.

Physical Fitness: Military academies place a strong emphasis on physical fitness. Maintain (*continued on page 8*)

a high level of physical fitness and prepare for the Physical Aptitude and Fitness Test (PAFT) or a similar test required by the academy.

Attend Candidate Visit Weekends: If invited, attend candidate visit weekends or summer seminars at the academy to get a firsthand experience of the academy's culture and training.

Complete the Candidate Fitness Assessment (CFA): The CFA measures physical fitness and is a crucial part of the application process for some academies. Prepare for it to ensure you meet the fitness standards.

Medical Qualifications: Department of Defense Medical Examination Review Board (DoDMERB) schedules medical exams for <u>all</u> officer accessions. DoDMERB medical exam will be scheduled when candidates complete 50% of application. Each Service Academy/officer accession program has different standards for entry.

Stay Informed: Keep in touch with your admissions counselor and stay informed about important deadlines and requirements throughout the application process.

Prepare for Interviews: If selected for an interview, practice your interview skills and be ready to discuss your motivations for attending the academy and your commitment to serving in the military.

Receive an Appointment: If you are selected, you will receive an appointment to the academy. Accept the appointment and complete any additional requirements, such as background checks and security clearances.

Complete Basic Training: Upon entering the academy, you will undergo basic military training, which is physically and mentally demanding.

Pursue Your Education: While at the academy, you will work towards a bachelor's degree and receive military training to become an officer in your chosen branch. Each Service Academy has their own core curriculum schedule.

Joining a military academy is a challenging but rewarding path to a career in the armed forces. It requires dedication, discipline, and a strong commitment to serve your country as an officer. Be sure to follow the specific application guidelines and requirements of the academy you are interested in, as they may vary from institution to institution.





Military Families and Home School

Military families may choose to homeschool their children for a variety of reasons, just like civilian families. However, the unique demands and lifestyle associated with military service can influence this decision in specific ways. Here are some reasons why military families might opt for homeschooling:

- 1. Frequent Relocations: Military families often move to different duty stations every few years. This can disrupt a child's education and make it challenging to maintain continuity in their schooling. Homeschooling provides flexibility and consistency in their education, as they can continue their curriculum regardless of where they are stationed.
- 2. Inconsistent School Quality: Schools near military installations can vary in terms of quality and resources. Homeschooling allows parents to have more control over the quality of education their children receive, ensuring it meets their standards and requirements.
- 3. Special Needs: Some military children have special educational needs, such as learning disabilities or medical conditions, that require individualized attention. Homeschooling allows parents to tailor the curriculum to meet these unique needs.

WHAT IS THE COMPACT?

The Compact deals with the challenges of military children and their frequent relocations. It allows for uniform treatment as military children transfer between school districts in member states. Note: The Compact only applies to public schools.

STUDENTS COVERED

Children of the following:

- Active duty members of the uniformed services, including members of the National Guard and Reserve on active duty orders (Title 10)
- Members or veterans who are medically discharged or retired for one year
- · Members who die on active duty, for a period of one year after death
- Uniformed members of the Commissioned Corps of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), and United States Public Health Services (USPHS)

STUDENTS NOT COVERED

Children of the following:

- Inactive members of the National Guard and Reserves (Not Title 10)
- Members now retired not covered above
- · Veterans not covered above
- · Other Department of Defense personnel, federal agency civilians and contract employees not defined as active duty
- · Members other than the uniformed personnel of NOAA and USPHS

SOME OF THE ISSUES COVERED

Enrollment

- · Educational Records
- Immunizations
- Kindergarten & First Grade Entrance Age

Placement & Attendance

- · Course & Educational Program Placement
- Special Education Services
- · Placement Flexibility
- · Absence Related to Deployment Activities

Graduation

- · Waiving courses required for graduation if similar course work has been completed
- · Flexibility in accepting state exit or end-ofcourse exams, national achievement tests, or alternative testing in lieu of testing requirements for graduation in the receiving state
- · Allowing a student to receive a diploma from the sending school instead of the receiving school

Through the Interstate Compact, MIC3 addresses key educational transition issues encountered by children of military families.

Area JROTC Cadets Plunge into World of Robotics with SeaPerch









Bay Area Education Alliance Wins 2023 Pete Taylor Partnership of Excellence Award
